German Exchange Student Update

When we landed in Munich after the long and exhausting flight my host family surprised me with a holiday to Northern Italy. One of the first things I noticed while we were driving was the distinct style of all of the houses, very formal and pretty. Driving south past all of the vineyards, mountains and castles was reminiscent of something from a fairy tale because it was so magical.



In Italy we stayed in a hotel in a small village called Klausen for three nights, eating pizza and croissants.



The next day we went for a walk into the Dolomites (a mountain range in Italy) and through beautiful pine forests where we heard a deer. Lunch had the best view and we ate a share platter of traditional sausages, ham, bread and cheese. The fields are very green even though their summer has not long ended and the cows all have bells around their necks which can be very loud when you walk past. In the forest here it's quite common to see hunters' lookouts



When we got back to Nußdorf we visited a group of scarecrows with pumpkin heads just behind Vinzenz's house. On the first day back, Vinzenz had marching band practice, so I was able to play the big gong gong drum (don't know its real name). School is decent and everyone is friendly but at times it's difficult to understand what the teacher is saying because they speak fast. I look forward to understanding what is going on. In Germany it's the middle of autumn but it feels almost like the middle of winter with days of only 10°C. On the whole I felt under-prepared. 

1876 BUILDING UPDATE

What's happening with the 1876 Building?

Currently the school, along with financial support from the Department of Education, are carrying out major remedial works on the original school building. The major impetus of the works is to ensure longevity of the building, old floors are being replaced, water ingress issues are being resolved and the building will receive an internal 'facelift' with repainting throughout.

In the short term we will experience some disruption. An area of the playground has been fenced off to allow the Builders to work freely whilst ensuring the students are safe at all times; instrumental music lessons have been relocated throughout the school; Outside Hours School Care is operating from Upper Primary.

Primary families are reminded to send a bottle of water with their child each day to assist with the temporary reduction in the number of water fountains available.

Works are due for completion by the 5th February 2018. Until then, thank you to everyone for their patience and understanding during the works.

Did you know It takes about 15 minutes to sew a bag? It also takes about 15 minutes to cut and iron a bag? We've done half the work for you, bags are already cut and handles cut and ironed. Our easy to sew take home packs will take about 1 hour to complete and will leave you with a real sense of accomplishment. If you have thought you would like to be involved and haven't been able to make a sewing bee please feel free to take a pack, make your self a cuppa and get sewing. Even if only used a handful of times in its life this 3 pack of ready to sew bags has the potential remove close to 100 bags from landfill.

MATERIALS

We are slowly developing a stock of materials (fabric and thread). If you have fabric to donate, please drop it off at one of our collection points (see below) or here at the School. Clean Cotton fabrics are best & remember the aim of the game is repurposing and re-using, so cotton bedding, old tablecloths, hessian or horse feedbags and large fabric remnants are ideal.

School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DEECD Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district. **Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire risk and is listed on the BARR.**



Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by letter. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.
- Out-of-school-hours care will also be cancelled on these days
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.
- As a bus co-ordinating school, all our bus routes will be cancelled.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the CFA advise that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day.

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan.

What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.



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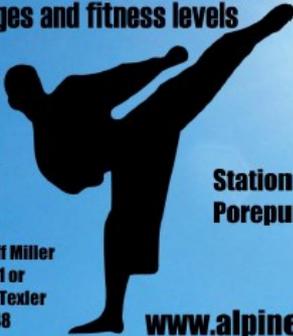
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
