E-SAFETY AND OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

Last week I was fortunate to attend a presentation by Greg Gebhart from the E-Safety Commission about Digital Citizenship and E-Safety. Some interesting facts were that:

- Most children's digital footprint is commenced on the day they are born.
- 10pm- 12midnight is the peak time for Aussie teens to be using the internet.
- Most young people are very trusting and believe online information.
- 50% of young people have taken a naked or semi naked photo of themselves and ¼ of those photos have been seen by someone else.
- There are many apps available for secret storage e.g. A calculator app that stores hidden content.
- Exposure to inappropriate content is most likely to of have occurred by 5 years of age.

Some pretty frightening statistics! However, the good news is the E-Safety Commission, which commenced about a year ago, is a great website with up to date information and it also has powers to assist when there are problems. One of the roles of the commission is to remove any inappropriate/ offensive/bullying content, contact the offender, warn them, contact parent/guardians, and if there is not a satisfactory outcome the police will be contacted. Greg stated that they have had offensive material removed within 20 minutes and the longest it has taken is 6 hours. He also said that in hundreds of cases they have only had one person reoffend. YEAR 3/4 JAN SPARKES VISIT

On Friday, 29th July, Jan Sparkes came to our classroom to speak to us about the life and culture of the Burmese people.

We thank Jan for giving her time to help us understand more about the background of our students from Burma (Law Kee, Sing Pai, Samantha and Joshua).

Following are some of the students' comments after Jan's presentation:

Today we were told where Law-Kee has lived, about his relatives and how he came to be in Australia. Law-Kee lived in Chin State which is sometimes called Chin Hills. Chin State is a state in Burma (also called Myanmar). One day, Law Kee's family moved to Malaysia where he had to live in Penang for a while before coming to Australia.

At ten past eleven, Jan Sparkes came to have a talk about a boy in my class called Law Kee Ling and some other things. Jan knows so many things about Burma. She showed some photos on the interactive whiteboard of Law Kee and Law Kee's family. I never knew how hard it was for Burmese children and adults to live in their country. Jan brings Burmese families to Australia. I learnt so much in that lesson.

I did not know that kids immigrated to different countries. I wouldn't want to have to move to a different country but Jan said that it was not that nice in Burma (Myanmar) because of the government. Law-Kee immigrated to Australia from Burma with his family and he is in my class. He is learning English very quickly! He is very lucky to be in Australia right now. It must be hard to go to a different country and have people speak to you in a foreign language.

Today Jan Sparkes came to talk about Burma and Chin State. That's where Law Kee lived. Burma was the old way of saying Myanmar. She told us what it looked like in (Burma, Myanmar). Also how they walked with no shoes because they were so poor.

Also, kids in Burma have playgrounds but they sometimes have to make them themselves. Burmese people have farms and grow some of their food. They like to eat rice, vegetables and soup.

Another thing I learnt was that it takes four years to become an Australian citizen. Law Kee lived in Chin State, which is in Burma. He has three younger sisters and one of them is at school. 
