

Assistant Principal's Report

### A REMINDER ABOUT OUR NUT MINIMALISATION POLICY

### **Purpose**

Bright P-12 College is committed to providing a safe environment that meets the special needs of our students. Students enrolled at our school who suffer from significant health problems require a supportive and flexible school environment that understands and responds to their individual needs. The purpose of this policy is to put procedures in place that <u>minimise the risk</u> of an anaphylactic reaction by students in our care.

# **Definitions**

### What is anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sudden allergic reaction. It occurs when a person is exposed to an allergen (such as food or an insect bite). Reactions usually begin within minutes of exposure and can progress rapidly over a period of up to two hours or more. Anaphylaxis is potentially life threatening and always requires an emergency response.

### **Policy**

Anaphylaxis is the most severe form of allergic reaction and is potentially life threatening. When students are enrolled at Bright P-12 College who are at risk of an anaphylaxis reaction the policies will be followed.

Bright P-12 College has developed a nut minimisation policy and guidelines in line with the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development. Emergency response plans are in place for all school activities.

It is possible to minimise the risk factor within the school environment with parent/carer assistance in adopting the following strategies.

In the Year Levels affected by the possibility of an anaphylactic reaction, parents are asked not to send nuts or peanuts to school and students are asked not to bring them. There is an increased risk of other food allergies in peanut allergic children, and because of the risk of cross contamination it is recommended that peanut allergic children avoid <u>all</u> nuts and nut products.

In particular, peanut butter, hazelnut spread (Nutella), certain muesli bars, chocolate bars and biscuits containing nuts. This applies to items with nuts as a listed ingredient or containing nut oils such as peanut oil but does not apply to those foods labelled 'may contain traces of nuts,

To ensure that others preparing their child's lunch (for example, Grandparents) are aware of the Nut

Minimisation Policy.

To avoid nuts and peanuts in birthday cakes or treats that may be brought to school.

Encourage the thorough washing of hands and face with a damp cloth if children have eaten these foods before coming to school.

Provide drink containers and lunch boxes which are clearly labelled with the name of the child for whom they are intended.

Discourage any trading or sharing of food.

Continue vigilance when there is a change from usual routines e.g. excursions, family picnic days at school, sports carnivals or discos.

A continuous awareness program will be provided through a range of strategies. Support of this initiative will be demonstrated through:

Teaching the children about the need for appropriate health and hygiene when raising awareness of the range of allergic reactions that may affect people in the community.

Highlighting values such as tolerance, understanding and an appreciation for the uniqueness of others and their needs through values education programs.

Reminders of our allergy friendly approach which will regularly appear in the school newsletters.

A letter outlining the points above is to be written to all parents in the grades of those children affected at the beginning of each school year with reminders when appropriate.

Please be mindful of this policy and make sure treats that you are packing for students end of year class parties are nut free.

# 35 Gifts Your Children Will Never Forget:

I can't take credit for the following but I thought at this time of mad rushing around to buy the biggest and best gifts it was a timely reminder about what really can make a difference to our children- Merry Christmas from Rosemary.

- **1. Affirmation.** Make sure your children know how much you appreciate them.
- **2. Art.** With the advent of the Internet, everyone who wants to create... can. The world just needs more people who want to...
- 3. Challenge. Encourage your child to dream big dreams. In turn, they will accomplish more than they thought possible... and probably even more than you thought possible.
- **4. Compassion/Justice.** Life isn't fair. It never will be there are just too many variables. But when a wrong has been committed or a playing field can be leveled, help your child to be active in helping to level it
- **5. Contentment.** The need for more is contagious. Therefore, one of the greatest gifts you can give your children is an appreciation for being content with what they have.
- **6. Curiosity.** Teach your children to ask questions about who, what, where, how, why, and why not.
- **7. Determination.** One of the greatest determining factors in one's success is the size of their will. How can you help grow your child's will today?
- **8. Discipline.** Children need to learn everything from the ground-up including appropriate behaviors, how to get along with others, how to get results, and how to achieve their dreams. Discipline should not be avoided or withheld. Instead, it should be consistent and positive.
- **9. Encouragement.** Words are powerful. The simple words that you choose to speak today can offer encouragement and positive thoughts.
- **10.** Faithfulness in your relationships. Be faithful and trustworthy in all relationships and in so doing be a good role model to your children.
- **11. Finding Beauty.** Help your children find beauty in everything they see... and in everyone they meet.
- **12. Generosity.** Teach your children to be generous.
- **13.** Honesty/Integrity. Children who learn the value and importance of **honesty** at a young age have a far greater opportunity to become honest adults.
- **14. Hope.** Hope is knowing and believing that things will get better and improve. It creates strength, endurance, and resolve.
- **15. Hugs and Kisses.** Know that your children are never too old to receive physical affirmation of your love for them.
- **16. Imagination.** If we've learned anything over the past 20 years, it's that life is changing faster and faster with every passing day. The world tomorrow looks nothing like the world today. And the people

- with imagination are the ones not just living it, they are creating it.
- **17. Intentionality.** Slow down, consider who you are, where you are going, and how to get there. And do the same for each of your children.
- **18. Your Lap.** It's the best place in the entire world for a book, story, or conversation. And it's been right in front of you the whole time.
- **19. Lifelong Learning.** A passion for learning is different from just studying to earn a grade or please teachers. It begins in the home. So read, ask questions, analyze, and expose.
- 20. Love. ... be happy to show and express love.



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# CHEMISTRY

### Unit 1 & 2 Chemistry Self-designed Experiments

As part of their studies in Unit 2 Chemistry, students had to design a quantitative volumetric analysis to determine the concentration of a range of different active ingredients in consumer products. Using acid-base titration, students determined such things as:

- The relative concentrations of phosphoric acid in coca-cola original and diet.
- The effectiveness of different brands of antacids in neutralising stomach acid to relieve indigestion.
- The relative concentrations of citric acid in fresh lemon and orange juice; fresh orange juice vs supermarket orange juice; different brands of lemonade.

The relative concentrations of ethanoic acid in brown and white vinegar; different brands of white vinegar.

- From Quarks to Quasars (Astrophysics); and Pharmaceutical Science.



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














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
