ONLY YEAR 7S TO RECEIVE VACCINATIONS IN 2016

Parents of older children may be aware that in previous years vaccinations were given to students in years 7 to 10.

However, the vaccine program for secondary students has been simplified this year so that all vaccines will only be offered to Year 7 students. This includes:


- Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis combined vaccine (dTp) – one dose
- Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine three doses
- Varicella (chicken pox) vaccine one dose

Parents of Year 7 students should look out for the vaccine consent card booklet coming home from school with your child. You need to read, complete and return Part A regardless of whether your child is being vaccinated at school.



Have you been looking for ways to support our successful VCE Program and helping our students reach their potential?

Do you enjoy being organised? Do you like having control? Do you like knowing the work you do is highly valuable and incredibly important?

Do you like to be financially rewarded for the work you do?

If you have answered yes to any of these questions, you may be the exact person we are looking for.

Each year our VCE Exams require a Chief VCE Exam Supervisor supported by a number of assistants to help supervise and coordinate the sitting of exams so they comply with the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority's (VCAA) strict guidelines. You will be supported by me as the VCE Coordinator and the current Chief VCE Exam Supervisor and assistants to fulfil a vital role within our VCE Program. The key exam dates will be:

- General Assessment Task (GAT) to be held on Tuesday 7th June, 2016 at Bright Community Entertainment Centre
- End of Year Exams to be held between Wednesday 26th October Friday 18th November 2016 (with more specific subject dates available in May, once VCAA has confirmed the exact timetable)

A formal one day training session will be held between the dates of 2-5 May 2016, from 10am – 3pm where training will be held at the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority Training Centre at 189 Urquhart Street, Coburg (which is off Bell Street). You will only need to attend one of these days.

Signing in

When you sign your child in you are giving permission for your child to partake in the timetabled activities, and agreeing to the terms and conditions of using Alpine Kids Club. Additional permission forms will need to be signed for excursions. If there are any activities listed that you would prefer your child didn't partake in, please let the educator on duty know.

Cost

The cost of Alpine Kids Club Vacation Program is \$45 per day, minus your individual Child Care Benefit (CCB) rebate. Some of the excursions will incur an additional cost. However most excursions have been subsided by Bright P-12 College, as a result these costs are minimal. No individual excursion will exceed \$10.00. All excursions must be prepaid to confirm your booking. NO REFUNDS will be given on excursions unless a doctor's certificate is provided. Please do not send your child with money, as no extra purchases will be permitted.

Cancellation & Late fees

Unless 2 working days notice is given, sessions will be charged for regardless of whether your child attends or not. Alpine Kids Club operates from 8:00am to 6:00pm. As a condition of using this service, you are responsible for ensuring your child is picked up on time. Please ensure you arrive no later than 6:00pm. A late fee of \$10.00 for the first 10 minutes and \$5.00 per minute after that is charged. These charges are not subsidised by your CCB.
