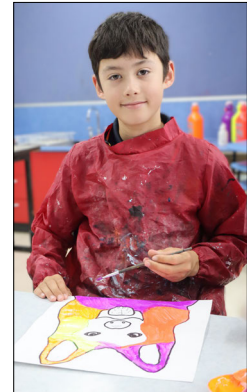

against bullying

1

stay calm – don't react or retaliate!

in some situations, this can make bullying worse



2

interrupt the bullying (if it's safe to do so)



3

remove the person being bullied from the situation, e.g. "Hey, come and sit with us."



4

offer support, e.g. "I saw what was happening and it's not ok! How are you feeling"



5

tell trustworthy adults. tell more than one and keep talking to them until the bullying has stopped.

myths vs facts



Myth: Reporting bullying will make it worse.

Fact: People who bully don't want you to report it as they don't want to get in trouble. Bullying rarely stops on its own – and keeping it secret often means it keeps happening.

Myth: Don't be a 'dobber'. Being a dobber is bad.

Fact: Dobbing is about getting someone in trouble over nothing. Bullying is a serious issue, and **reporting it helps keep people safe** – so it's a brave, important and empowering thing to do.

Bullying is very common – 1 in 4 students in Australia experience bullying.



Myth: You should just ignore bullying.

Fact: People confuse ignoring bullying with not reacting to it. If someone bullies you, it's important to not react – as they often want a reaction (e.g. for you to get angry or upset) and this can 'feed' the bullying. However, you shouldn't ignore bullying, pretend it isn't happening and just hope it will go away on its own.

Safety is a basic human right.
This means everyone has a right to be safe.



Myth: If you stand up for someone who is being bullied, you'll become their target.

Fact: The best way to stop bullying is for people who witness it to intervene. It just takes one person to speak up – normally, when one person does the right thing, other people back them up and also speak up.

Myth: If lots of people see bullying happening, it's not up to me to intervene.

Fact: According to research, the more people who witness bullying, the less likely they are to speak up.

We all have a responsibility to stop bullying.

Myth: Bullying builds character. People who get upset about it are too sensitive.



Fact: Bullying can cause physical and psychological harm. It's normal and understandable to be upset about being bullied.

Did you know?
Some types of bullying can actually be illegal.

Myth: It's ok to hurt or get back at someone who's bullying you to show you aren't weak.



Fact: Reacting with aggression often makes the situation worse and can get you into trouble too.

Did you know?
People who bully others have sometimes been bullied themselves.

Myth: Only people who are weak/ unpopular/ inferior get bullied.



Fact: When we say that being bullied isn't your fault, what we mean is that you aren't the problem.

Bullying is a problematic behaviour – and people who bully often do that behaviour many times – in different situations, towards different people and at different points in their life. While it's true that people who bully do target people, they target people for all sorts of different reasons – and being a target doesn't mean that you're weak, unpopular or inferior. And no one deserves to be bullied, no matter what.

People who bully often do so for personal reasons about themselves or personal problems they are facing/struggling with. This is never a 'reason' to bully someone or an 'excuse' for bullying.

If you're being bullied...



Respond, rather than REACT

- Stay calm
- Don't react emotionally – people who bully usually want you to get angry or upset

Report it and get support

- Tell trustworthy adults and keep talking to them until the bullying stops

Yr 7 CAMP

On the 3rd of March, 40 excited Year 7 students boarded a bus to Camp Coolamatong on the Banksia Peninsula. Over four days, students enthusiastically participated in a range of structured and unstructured activities with ski tubing and '9 Square in the Air' being highlights for many.

"My favourite things were ski tubing, combat archery, fox holes and survivor." Ari P

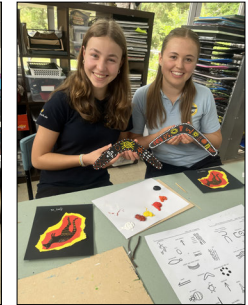

GERMAN EXCHANGE

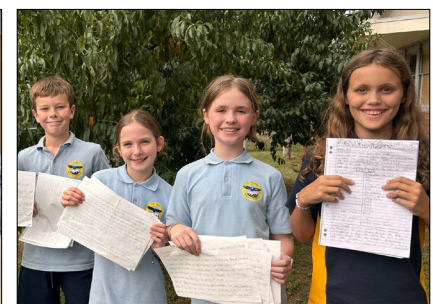
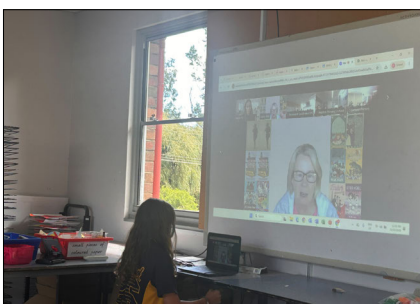

RESILIENCE, RIGHTS AND RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

Topic 1 of the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships (RRRR) program focuses on building a strong foundation for positive relationships and emotional wellbeing across all year levels. The topic introduces students to key concepts such as respect, inclusion, kindness and the importance of valuing diversity. Students learn that everyone has the right to feel safe, respected and supported within their school and community.

Across all levels, learning activities encourage students to reflect on their own identities, recognise the strengths and differences in others, and develop empathy. Students explore how respectful behaviour contributes to positive relationships and a safe learning environment. They are supported to understand the impact their words and actions can have on others and how to demonstrate fairness, cooperation and kindness in everyday interactions.

Topic 1 also introduces the idea that everyone belongs and that diversity should be celebrated. Students discuss ways to include others, challenge stereotypes and build a classroom culture where everyone feels welcome. Through age-appropriate discussions, activities and reflections, students develop social and emotional skills that help them form healthy relationships, resolve conflicts respectfully and contribute positively to their school community. These foundations support students' wellbeing, confidence and sense of belonging at Bright P-12 College.

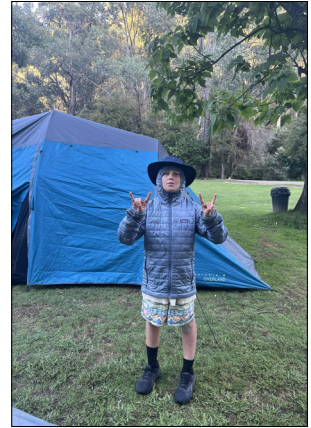
