Prep and Year 1 students visited the College Garden recently to check up on the progress of the broad beans that they planted in Term 2, and to sample some fresh veggies. Our snow pea experiment has resulted in early snow peas in the green house which the students enjoyed. Snap dragons were in full colour, and the students enjoyed sniffing at their sweet scent. The fresh lettuce and baby carrots were a hit, with students happily munching anything on offer. I think we made a large dint in their vitamin and mineral dietary needs for the day! They filled their pots with soil and planted beans, pumpkin, zucchini, tomatoes, watermelon, capsicum, chilli and cucumber seeds. Pots were labelled with the date and the variety; students also added their initials so that they could follow their progress.

We expect germination in 7 to 12 days, with planting out to occur in Term 4. Once the pots were in the greenhouse, the misting system was turned on resulting in irrigated pots and students!

In Forensic Science, we refreshed our microscopy skills by analysing an unknown thread sample 'from a crime scene' and comparing it to a collection of known fabrics to determine its origin. We practiced preparing a wet mount slide, using the coarse focus to locate the sample, and then fine-tuning with higher magnification for closer analysis.

ALUMNI

We spoke to Eric English, who graduated from Bright P-12 College in 2012 and is currently teaching Yr 11 Biology, Yr 7 Science, Yr 10 Environmental Science and Yr 10 General Science, at a school in Melbourne.

What did you study at Bright P-12 College?

I started in Year 7 at Bright P-12 College, coming From Wandiligong Primary School. In VCE I did Yr 12 Psychology in 2011 and then Yr 12 Biology (Dux), Physics, English Literature, English and Maths Methods in 2012.

What have you been doing since leaving school?

Straight from school I went to study a Bachelor of Environmental Science (Marine Biology) at Deakin in Warrnambool. From there I worked in several jobs including at:

- An abalone farm
- A couple of Green Army projects (a government environmental initiative for young people)
- Parks Victoria in Mount Beauty, on the Hawkweed Project
- An 'environmental services' company in Melbourne that did several things including weed control, bushland management, planting plants, cutting grass and general council maintenance

In 2020 I decided to start studying teaching. I graduated from Deakin with a Master of Teaching in 2021 and have since been working at 2 schools in Melbourne as a Science Teacher including VCE Biology.

What inspired you to follow your current career?

After working several jobs roughly in the field of Environmental Science, I wanted a career change and I wanted to use and pass on the knowledge that I had learnt at school and University, as well as in the workplace. The master's degree was tough after 5 years of not doing academic writing, but I persisted.

Any advice for students at our school?

Find things you like to do and practice and improve them. You will be learning without realising it.

In school, work smart as well as hard. School isn't everything, but it can help you get to where you want to be and it teaches you important things that may be taken for granted that are used every day outside of school.

GOTAFE INTERVIEW



We spoke to Kel Vincent, who works in Youth Engagement at GOTAFE in Wangaratta, and asked him some questions about his role. Kel visits Bright P -12 College and works 1:1 with some of our students to discuss pathways and opportunities post school.

Can you tell us a little about your role at GoTafe? I have been working within the Skills and Jobs Centre at GOTAFE for over 7 years and before that I worked at GOTAFE as a trainer and assessor in Building and Construction for over 12 years. My current role as a qualified careers practitioner enables me to assist with pathway guidance and advice for senior secondary school students, families and schools.

How do you work with schools and students in the North East? I work with a catchment of schools from Wangaratta to Benalla to Yarrawonga and the Alpine area. I visit schools and work directly with their careers/pathways


teams and their students upon referral. This may be one on one support or more broad group talks and presentations. I am also available to meet directly with students and their parent/carer on-site at GOTAFE Wangaratta for careers services.

What can VET offer students considering their pathway after school? Students accessing VET through either the VDSS program or SBAT's can gain meaningful exposure and access to formal training through certificate level qualifications. This not only helps them make informed decisions about post-school pathways but can also enhance their opportunities for employment and/or further study.


Is there anything new or emerging happening in VET that we can share with students and their families? VET is always evolving with a focus on current industry trends like green energy or demands in the health sector. Trades are a constant and often gain significant attention due to industry needs for a growing skilled workforce. Whilst we do see a lot of attention on the likes of carpentry, plumbing and electrical, its good to inform students that there is a multitude of other trades within that sector that are on the lookout for apprentices/trainees. For example, glass and glazing, concreting, cabinet making etc.

Anything else you would like to share? The information and discussions that take place when students are planning their 'next steps' from secondary school can be at times confusing and a little overwhelming, this includes for parents/ carers. Working within the Skills and Jobs Centre enables us to assist families, students and schools with impartial guidance and assistance relative to not just TAFE options, but also University, employment and workforce opportunities.
