FUNDRAISING

At the end of last term, Year 12 school leaders arranged a fundraiser for Motor Neurone Disease (MND) or ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. Students and staff participated in the Ice Bucket Challenge to raise awareness and money to help find a cure for MND. MND is the name given to a group of diseases in which the nerve cells - neurones - control the muscles that enable us to move, speak, breathe and swallow; undergo degeneration and die. Students and staff who endured the Ice Bucket Challenge are now part of a group of over 17 million people around the world who have had ice water dumped on their heads and donated to an MND organisation. We raised \$163.55.

OLYMPIAN LUKE PLAPP VISIT



Late last term, multiple times Australian cycling champion and resident of Wandiligong, Luke Plapp, paid a visit to the Year 5 and 6 students to share his story as he prepares for the upcoming Olympic Games in Paris. Luke spent over an



hour talking with the students, answering their questions and talking about his background and career so far. He reflected on how he became a professional cyclist living and racing in the world's biggest races in Europe after winning a bronze medal at the 2021 Tokyo Olympics in the team pursuit on the track.

Luke also talked about how he is looking ahead to representing Australia in the time trial and road race in France.

Yr 1/2 TREE PLANTING

Back in July 2023, our Prep, Year 1 and Year 2 students planted trees and shrubs in Sommer Park with help from the Alpine Shire Council. Recently, the Year 1/2 class visited Sommer Park to see how much the plants had grown. WOW! They looked so big, strong and healthy. It was great to check on their progress and see the huge changes.



Yr 9 SCIENCE




PREP JAPANESE SPEECH PRESENTATION


Yr 10 PRODUCT DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

Students have followed the product design process to investigate, design and create wooden toys that adhered to a predetermined list of constraints. Students were creative and innovative in the designs they chose and did well to put their production plans into practice.




Yr 11 PE

The Year 11 Physical Education students are currently studying the Skeletal and Muscular system and they are focused on answering the following two questions: How does the musculoskeletal system work to produce movement? And how does the cardiorespiratory system function at rest and during physical activity? Classes involve theory sessions, using different methods to remember all the key muscles, bones and joint movements along with practical sessions where students get to analyse the movements in different sports. Handball, Volleyball, Basketball and Netball are used for different skill and movement analysis, as well as specific weights sessions to study muscle contraction.



Yr 9 CAD/CAM/ROBOTICS

Being a new subject at Bright P-12 College for 2024, students were introduced to several software applications and technologies with a mechatronic engineering focus. Students first learnt some fundamental skills involving Computer Aided Drawing software, Computer Aided Manufacture technologies and Arduino Robotics systems. These skills were then used to create an LED light with a customised display and colour program.


END OF TERM ASSEMBLY
