Yr 12 CHEMISTRY

Year 12 students completing the practical component of their experimental design task.

PARLIAMENT AND CIVICS EDUCATION REBATE

Our Year 5 & 6 Students have recently undertaken an education tour of Canberra, the national capital. Students were given the opportunity to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy. The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion, the Australian Government is contributing funding of \$75 per student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program towards those costs. The rebate is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.

Yr 6 STEM INCURSION

Last term, Year 6 students welcomed staff from the VSSEC (Victorian Space Science Education Centre) for a very special incursion. This STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) activity fosters critical thinking skills to teach students to understand, communicate and solve problems individually and collaboratively. Our students worked in groups to control 'Sphero SPRK+' robot



spheres in a Mars-like environment. They planned a path for a survey mission on Mars, considering co-ordinates, angles and bearings, fractions and percentages at each way point of their survey in order to reach the next way point with their spheres.

This activity wasn't easy! Students had to overcome challenges and figure out the best way forward. This put their Maths, logic, communication and teamwork skills to the test. The rewards were well worth it with whoops of delight heard in the Year 6 classrooms. We are proud of how well our students worked together, using critical and creative thinking to explore a new environment and apply their learning to this fun task.















FIREFIGHTING TRAINING

Students from Bright P-12 College and Myrtleford P-12 College are currently undertaking 8 units from the nationally recognised Certificate II in Public Safety (Firefighting Operations) course.

During the first 5 weeks of this term, Melissa from Magenta Safety training will teach students the knowledge and skills associated with safety and firefighting. This course is transferable to almost any industry and will help prepare our students to transition to the work force, life and studying beyond school.







SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

During the last weeks of Term 3, students from Year 3 up to Year 12 volunteered time during their lunch breaks to assist with planting in the new garden space on Deacon Avenue. Earlier in the year we planted 250 small trees and shrubs, which have mostly survived the frosts and are now thriving.

This time around we planted ground covers, climbers and perennial herbs to fill the understory. So far we have planted: 350 indigenous plants around the perimeter of the garden; 25 fruit trees; currants; raspberries; blueberries; rhubarb; strawberries; yam daisies; snow peas; onions (red, brown and white); and a canoe full of herbs and potatoes!

Many thanks to our volunteer students. It was great to see such a wide age range of students coming together and assisting each other. We look forward to seeing our plants grow, especially the fruit trees!

Spread over two classes, our Year 5 and 6 students learnt dance skills and technique, before showing off their best moves learning a choreographed routine to a Michael Jackson classic. Maiya and Holly took time out of their busy schedule to not only take these classes, but to create a detailed series of steps for our students to learn and rehearse. We are looking forward to developing more opportunities for our Primary and Secondary students to collaborate and learn from each other.





CHARLES STURT INCURSION

During the last week of Term 3, students from Years 7-11 participated in workshops delivered by staff from Charles Sturt University - Albury/Wodonga Campus. Students engaged in a range of activities (varied at each year level) that exposed them to a diverse range of careers and courses. They also learnt about life at university.

These workshops empowered our students to make informed decisions about their education and future pathways. The sessions were well received by all students, and we look forward to having an ongoing relationship in the future with Charles Sturt University.

School preparedness and pre-emptive actions for the bushfire season

Schools and early childhood services undertake a range of activities each year to prepare for bushfires and grassfires. The Department of Education conducts an annual fire risk assessment of schools and early childhood services. Those at the greatest levels of risk are published on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR). As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan.



What does this mean for our school?

Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category 3 school. Our school will close on a day forecasted as Catastrophic fire danger rating in North East fire district.

What is the department's policy?

The department's Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled.

When will our school be closed due to Catastrophic fire danger?

Closure of the school due to a forecast Catastrophic day will be confirmed on the day prior and we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day. Any information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire danger days will be communicated to you by Compass.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. Please be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- Out-of-school-hours care will also be cancelled on these days.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas that have Catastrophic fire danger.

Families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan on Catastrophic fire danger rating days. **On such days,** children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Catastrophic days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day.

What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

- Ensure we have your current details, including your mobile phone numbers.
- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event
 that our school is closed due to elevated fire danger or closed due to a Catastrophic fire danger. Further
 information can be found on the CFA's website.
- Enact your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community may be spread out across many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others. Your family's safety is critical, so please let us know if you are enacting your bushfire survival plan and if your children will be absent on these days.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.
