

Yr 8 ECONOMICS

Year 8 economics students are currently studying social enterprises, and visited Dumu café to see a local social enterprise in person. Students heard a history of the café and learnt about people and communities the café training benefits. They learnt that access to practical training in Wadeye is limited and participants come to Dumu café to learn

about western culture, language and ways of living. Students learnt:

- Wadeye is so remote that when it floods you can only access the area by plane.
- Women can't play the digeridoo and siblings of different genders can't talk to each other.
- The word Dumu means black duck in Dhudhuroa language of north-eastern Victoria.
- The trainees don't all come from Wadeye. They grow up on country and Wadeye, which is the central town for education, healthcare and work.






2023 YEARBOOKS

Yr 8 SCIENCE

Year 8 students used scientific methods by doing a lab investigation making qualitative (descriptive) and quantitative (measurable) observations on different "species" of gummi worms and using the data collected to make comparisons and create graphical representations of this data.



SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

We are entering an exciting phase in our sustainability journey that will see the College and the community working together to enhance our educational and environmental outcomes.

Thanks to joint funding provided to the Alpine Shire Council from the Commonwealth and State Governments, we were able to secure a grant from the 'Revitalising our Environment' Grant Program. The grant funds will go towards providing a fenced enclosure on our Deacon Avenue site - between the stadium access road and the Alpine View Childcare Centre. Approximately 3,000 native plants will be planted around the inside perimeter of the enclosure. Stage 2 of the

program will involve developing the interior of the enclosure into an educational gardening space, including an orchard, greenhouse, food forest, composting systems and worm farms.

These initiatives aim to enhance student growth via a range of activities, including student-led planning and action groups across Primary and Secondary; dynamic and authentic hands-on outdoor learning; building ecological understanding through direct contact with the natural world; providing a calm environment that reduces stress and promotes engagement.





THE EMBRACE HUB

Last year, our Secondary students attended Wellbeing Workshops and watched the Embrace Kids documentary. The documentary was produced by 2023 Australian of the Year Taryn Brumfitt. The documentary focuses on body positivity and fighting the intense pressures placed on young people.

Since then, Bright P-12 College teaching staff have been accessing information on The Embrace Hub website and using the resources available to support young people at our school.

The website also features a wealth of information for parents, including podcasts, videos, tips on books to read and websites to visit with your tweens and teens. The resources are put together by a



team of experts, headed up by Dr Zali Yager, an internationally-recognised body image researcher who has worked in this space for 20 years. The language is very friendly and focuses on positive ways to help young people.

Some key statistics:

- People with body dissatisfaction are 24x more likely to develop depression and anxiety (McLean et al., 2021; Bornioli et al., 2021).
- 22% of adolescents are affected by eating disorders (Mitchison et al., 2020).
- 77% of young Australian adults report body image distress, which has more than doubled from the 33% reporting body image distress in 2009 (Milton et al., 2021).

Yr 10 SCIENCE - EXTRACTING DNA

All living things have DNA (the chemical instructions on how to make a living thing). It can easily be seen with the naked eye when collected from thousands of cells. You can extract DNA easily from a strawberry and view it by following a very simple method as our Year 10 students did. Strawberries are a good source of DNA because they have 8 copies of each of their 7 chromosomes. We crushed up our strawberry, added it to solution containing dishwashing detergent and salt, added a little ethanol and wow! We saw the DNA.

Why do we use the dishwashing liquid? The dishwashing liquid busts open the cells of the strawberries, releasing the DNA. Why do we use the salt? It ensures that the proteins in the cell are not separated from the rest of the solution with the DNA. What does the alcohol contribute to the experiment? When molecules are insoluble (unable to be dissolved), they clump together and become visible. DNA is not soluble in alcohol; therefore, it makes the DNA strands clump together and become visible to the naked eye.



MUSIC NEWS

Instrumental Program. We are fortunate at Bright P-12 College to offer an extensive instrumental program for students. We offer tuition on a number of instruments, thanks to a very talented group of instrumental teachers. Learning a musical instrument has been shown to provide many benefits to a child academically, personally and socially in their development. Students who learn an instrument will be encouraged to perform at regular concerts in school and out in the community. The recommended age to start to learn an instrument is from Year 3 and above. Please contact your preferred teacher directly. The teacher will discuss the costs and the materials required for the lessons. The lesson time will be organised after consultation with the student's class teacher, music coordinator and deputy principal as necessary.

Choirs. Prep - Year 2 Choir takes place at the start of lunch on Mondays in the Music Room. Year 3-6 Choir takes place at the start of lunch on Fridays in the Music Room. Mr Campbell will announce where the students are to meet and will then walk them up to the Music Room. Being involved is free and the students will perform at different concerts throughout 2024.

Ukulele Groups. The aim of these sessions is for the students to learn some basic skills on the Ukulele and to have fun. There is no cost involved and total beginners are welcome and encouraged. Beginner Ukulele Group (Prep - Year 2) meets on Tuesdays 8.15-8.45am in the Music Room. Senior Ukulele Group (Year 3 and above) meets Fridays 8.15-8.45am in the Music Room
