Yr 11 BIOLOGY

As part of Unit 1 Biology, students designed their own experiments to investigate a factor that affects the rate of anaerobic respiration or photosynthesis:

- Lily, Zoe & Ruby: How does glucose concentration affect the rate of anaerobic respiration in yeast alginate balls?
- Sophie: How does temperature affect the rate of anaerobic respiration in yeast alginate balls?
- Charlotte: How does wavelength of light affect the rate of photosynthesis in elodea (pond weed)?
- Elsie: How does carbon dioxide concentration affect the rate of photosynthesis in spinach discs?
- Bella: How does wavelength of light affect the rate of photosynthesis in spinach and ivy discs?

After they carried out their experiments, students presented their experiments as a scientific poster.

Yr 11 ABORIGINAL LANGUAGES OF VICTORIA

Recently, students from the Year 11 Aboriginal Languages of Victoria (ALV) Revival and Reclamation class visited Year 3 & 4 classrooms. The VCE students worked in small groups to prepare and run a Dhudhuroa language lesson for the younger students. Lessons included a story and a focus on the teaching of key Dhudhuroa vocabulary words.

This was part of our work for Outcome 3: Use of the target language of reclamation and creating a language learning resource. During the visits, students used the Dhudhuroa language to play games with the younger students, helping them to learn these words. Games such as 'repeat if correct', memory, 'around the world' and also the online game, Blooket were very successful in getting students to use the Dhudhuroa words. By the end of each session, most children were able to recognise and say the key words. Each session was well received by the younger students.

Congratulations to all students involved and thank you for your efforts with language revival for Dhudhuroa.
