


### FRANKIE UPDATE





Our Yr 11 & 12 students attended a talk by David Constantine MBE recently. He was visiting Australia from the UK, where he lives. This was a wonderful opportunity to see a world-class speaker in our own school.

About David: after a life-shattering accident in Queensland at the age of 21 which left him paralysed from the shoulders down, he picked himself up and has travelled the world teaching people how to make wheelchairs from cheap, locally-available materials. He co-founded Motivation, a charity working to improve the quality of life of people with mobility impairment. Motivation makes wheelchairs that are light and functional, rather than the heavy, institutional things which used to be all that was available to so many disabled people.

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**Principal's** Message

Dear Students, Parents and Carers,

At our school, we value diversity and we provide an inclusive, safe and respectful school and workplace. We have introduced Respectful Relationships education across P-12. This program takes a whole-school approach that is about embedding a culture of respect and equality across our entire school community, from classrooms to staffrooms, sporting fields, fêtes and social events. This approach leads to positive impacts on students' academic outcomes, mental health, classroom behaviour, and relationships with teachers. To complement this approach and broaden our impact, 3 staff; Mat Gray, Phil Rigby and Natasha Tough recently attended the Modelling Respect and Equity Program (MoRE) which aims to build skills and knowledge to help people create change in their community around issues of respect and equality, particularly amongst the places that shape the cultures of boys and men, like sporting clubs, special interest groups, schools, workplaces and other organisations. This is important work and I would like to thank all staff,

students, parents and community members for their support as we continue to strive for the very best for the young people in our care.

Last week, we said "tschüss" to the German students who have been attending Bright P-12 College and are currently in Sydney. Our long-term German exchange students will be back to join us for the rest of term and our short-term students will head back to their families in Germany after their time in Sydney. It was a wonderful, exciting and rewarding time for all involved and I would like to extend a huge thank you to all staff, students and parents who were involved this year. Your efforts, warmth and engagement have added value to the program and ensured its continuity into the future. Later in the year we will be returning to our sister school in Germany with a group of staff, short and long stay students.

# **COLLEGE COUNCIL CHAT**

I am pleased to introduce a new column in the school newsletter where we share some of the more significant or interesting activities and discussions from the College School Council.

- Compass Cards as part of the process of reducing cash handling at the Canteen we are looking at introducing Compass Cards. These cards would replace the current student cards and provide a school-only "debit card". Money can be deposited into the Compass account and then spent at the canteen. Council supports the idea in principle but has asked for more detail about the process of depositing and spending the money.
- Primary playground soccer pitch the area immediately above the Park St bus stop is in very high use by Primary students and the current grass tends toward hard dirt in summer and mud in winter. A proposal is in front of council that we cover the surface in artificial turf and fence it (to prevent balls being kicked into the road and the neighbouring property.). An initial indicative quote puts this at around \$75,000. A grant is available which could provide up to \$25,000. Council has approved applying for the grant toward this project and that the project is fully assessed by Finance & Environment sub-committees.
- Covered Outdoor Area a proposal to build a covered area over the basketball courts raised issues of access to all weather play space and also an overall school site masterplan. The proposal has been added to our Pipeline of Projects to be considered as planning and finances permit.
- **Uniform Pants** we are waiting on a sample of new school pants that hopefully address issues of durability and length. Councillors will review these as soon as they arrive.
- **Primary Playground tunnel** the primary playground tunnel was a Parent and Community funded and driven project that has been stalled for some time as we try to resolve various issues with compliance. We have had expert inspections and design proposals but it remains a difficult issue to solve.
- Sustainability staff position we are developing a Position Description for a part time Sustainability Coordinator position. This position would support students and staff to develop, implement & expand sustainability measures within the school. This might include reduction of waste, increased recycling, energy reduction, solar power generation, composting etc. It has been seen that although there is enthusiasm for these types of measures at school the reality is that staff and students struggle to find the time to effectively support their implementation.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our outgoing councillors for their time on council, Dave Dalbosco, Gillean Hilton, Tracy Carey, Karlene Beck, Kira Mack and Daisy Stonehouse. Your input and willingness to contribute to the discussions that help guide the school are very much appreciated. A special thanks to Dave Dalbosco who has offered to remain on the Environment sub-committee where his knowledge of the school grounds and professional knowledge are extremely valuable.

School Council meets twice each term. Between these meetings sub-committees meet once each to form recommendations to take to the full council meetings, generally councillors are only on one sub-committee. The sub-committees are: Finance, Environment (school grounds & facilities), Education & Policy, Parents & Community.

### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

#### **CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)**

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities. If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form. If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances. eg: **new student enrolments**; your child has started or changed schools this year, or **changed family circumstances**; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

#### State Schools Relief - Uniform support for families

Year 7 students who receive CSEF are eligible for a Year 7 Uniform Pack from SSR - order forms are available from the Office. Lachie is a member of the Alpine and Albury/Wodonga Cycling Clubs and has trained throughout the summer at the velodromes in Melbourne and Albury. His hard work paid off, racing smart and hard at DISC in Melbourne two weekends ago. He achieved the following results:

Lachlan has been selected as one of the 5 riders in the Victorian junior squad under 15 Men to compete at the 2023 AusCycling Junior Track National Championships in Brisbane from April 11th - 14th. And he won another gold medal in the Keirin state championships last weekend.




# Bushfire At-Risk Register - Schools

#### School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined in their Bureau of



Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by letter and Compass Notification. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.
- As a bus co-ordinating school all bus routes will be cancelled.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day.

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan, reprioritised any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire and cleared our facility's grounds and gutters.

#### What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.
- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading
  our newsletters, by checking Compass and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff
  about our emergency management plan.
- Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.


