








#### **LIBRARY NEWS**

#### WELLBEING DOG




Dear Parents/Carers,

In striving to nurture the love of learning, health and wellbeing of each school member, Bright P-12 College is excited to welcome a wellbeing initiative of introducing a Wellbeing Dog to our community.

Research has guided our decision with known benefits of increased transition support, increased attendance, increased motivation for learning and increased positive interactions. Further, increased reading and writing levels which boosts self-confidence. Additionally, a Wellbeing Dog in a school environment has shown to decrease levels of anxiety, stress and behavioural incidences, whilst improving the ability to self and co-regulate.

Over the coming weeks there will be updates, further information and education around the implementation of the Wellbeing Dog supplied to students, staff and parents/carers. The program we are working with for training and integration is Dogs Connect; https://dogsconnect.net.au/

On the Compass post I have included an introductory video from Dogs Connect.





## Yr 12 ENGLISH

Socrates (470-399 BC), a classical Greek philosopher, believed that through the process of dialogue, where all parties to the conversation were forced to clarify their ideas, the final outcome of the conversation would be a clear statement of what was meant.

In a Socratic Circle, participants seek deeper understanding of complex ideas in a text through thoughtful dialogue, rather than by memorising bits of information. The goal of this activity is to have participants work together to construct meaning and arrive at shared understandings. As we learn this technique, observers / partners provide feedback to the participants on their level and type of communication.

## **CHEMISTRY**



This year, our Year 11 & 12 Chemistry students from Bright P-12 College are participating in the International Chemistry Quiz and the Royal Australian Chemistry Institute Titration Quiz.

Year 11 Chemistry students were investigating the solubility of a range of ionic compounds and writing balanced chemical equations. Students then applied this knowledge to determine the identity of unknown solutions, developing their critical thinking and problem solving skills.







Year 12 Chemistry students were carrying out Self-Designed Experiments as part of an assessment task. Students had to design and carry out an experiment and then produce a scientific poster to communicate the results. Lachie H and Injala were each investigating the amount of energy released (heat of combustion) from the burning of different fuels, such as methanol and ethanol. Libby was determining the effect of voltage on the amount of metal produced in electrolysis. Claire was determining the effect of concentration of electrolyte on the amount of metal produced in electrolysis.









#### **CREATIVE WORKERS IN SCHOOLS**

Ngamilmali Maarumali translates to teach and heal in the Gamilarray language of the Gamilaroi peoples. The program teaches students the Indigenous ways of knowing and being, and invites a greater understanding of culture, to increase the quality of their relationship and connectedness to Mother Earth. It is recognised as a health and wellness program featuring: Aboriginal language, Wayapa Wuurrk, movement (the rhythm of Country) and Mindfulness, while supporting sustainability learning. The content is delivered in a contemporary style that allows culture to be visible again. It encourages students to develop a deep appreciation for Country that is celebrated through Meditation, Art, and Music.

The program is facilitated through our Creative Workers in Schools, Lee Couch, First Nations Woman, and Health and Wellness Practitioner and musician Joe Davies.

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
Footsteps

"I have had the privilege this term to work with Lee Couch and Joe Davis as part of the Creative Artists in Schools program. Lee has come into my year 5 and 6 music classes and incorporated learning about Aboriginal culture. She has taught this by getting the students to connect with it through mindfulness, meditation, singing and reflection activities. Here in this picture you can see some students sitting by the nearby creek engaged in an Aboriginal meditation and movement activity. This is called Dadirri, which is a Northern Territory words that translates to 'Listen Deep' in the language of the people from the Daly River.

Joe has engaged with my middle and lower primary classes and has run some activities using Djembe drums based on playing together and playing some basic rhythms. Joe and Lee have also worked with the P-2 Primary Choir teaching some simple Aboriginal songs. Joe has worked with the 3-6 Choir teaching them some popular music in a different way." ## Yr 8 SCIENCE

The year 8 Science class have been working through body sciences during this term.

Students have been researching the circulatory system in class, looking in detail at how the heart works and the different blood vessels that make the system function as it should.

We have explored the digestive system through a descriptive story.

We have also explored the respiratory system, through experiments comparing inhaled air and exhaled air changes.

Now, students are finishing off with a sheep's heart dissection as part of the practical assessment for this unit of work.

During the dissection, students are looking to identify the different chambers of the heart, where the deoxygenated and oxygenated blood gets pumped as well as feeling the texture of the heart muscle.

Students will complete a report on their dissection and this, along with their practical participations, will form their assessment in science.


