

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Yr 10 Overnight Alpine Hike. It was a cool start to the day with some high level cloud blocking out the sun and the view of the summit of Mount Bogong. We warmed up quickly as the group started their ascent up the Staircase Spur. Eye spy, the alphabet of animals and bands, and many questions about how far away the hut was kept the group occupied on the steepest part of the Spur. Bivouac Hut was reached with welcome relief. After lunch we continued up the final 3km and 580m of elevation, past Castor Outcrop, to the summit of Mount Bogong where we were greeted with clear skies, sunshine, and light winds. Our weary legs welcomed the relative flat of the main ridge, which we followed south to our campsite nestled in the snow gums next to Cleve Cole Hut. Tents were set up and students cooked meals on the Trangia stoves as the sun set, some with more success and less burning than others.

We awoke early the next day to sunshine beaming into our tents and a surprisingly warm start to the day in the alpine zone. After breakfast, a very quick and efficient camp pack up saw the group hiking back along the ridge and down Eskdale Spur. Spirits were high, and everyone was looking forward to walking downhill. The group walked efficiently and used the extra time to enjoy the sunshine and views before descending back into the treeline to Michelle Hut. Once at Camp Greek Gap, the students set a fast pace back towards the bus along the four-wheel drive track, slowed only slightly by several creek crossings. It was a very physically challenging hike, and the students managed this challenge well. Thanks to Cari and Marcus for helping on the hike.







Year 11 Kayaking and Mountain Biking. Students kayaked from Star Road Bridge down through the Canyon on the Ovens River. They also mountain biked on the trails at Mystic Mountain Bike Park. Thanks to Tasman and Marcus for helping out with the sessions, and to the Year 11 students who were great fun to work with and very capable on the river and mountain bike trails.





Year 9 Kayak Training Sessions and Goulburn River Trip. Students learnt about the river, identifying hazards and highlighting key safety practices. They learnt and practiced the white water swimming position and demonstrated their ability to swim 50m wearing all of their kayaking clothing. They also learnt what to do when they fall off their kayak and demonstrated their ability to self rescue in deeper water. Then students learnt and practiced their basic paddling strokes and how to manoeuvre the kayaks. They built on their existing skills, learning to ferry glide, catch eddies and paddle down the rapid above the Star Road bridge. The Eildon Kayaking Trip on the Goulburn River was the big finale to the Year 9 Outdoor Education Kayaking unit. We loaded up the kayaking and camping gear from school and headed to Blue Gums Caravan Park on the banks of the Goulburn River. Most of the river is quite wide and slow flowing, which presented excellent opportunities for practicing paddling in a straight line, playing games, swimming and having a good time. Near the caravan park, the river has been altered to include more features and obstacles, so that it can be used as a training area for slalom kayakers. The students used this area to put into practice the various kayaking skills that they had learnt during the training days. It was a very enjoyable and successful trip. Thank you to Marcus and Cari for helping out, and the Yr 9 ODE students for embracing all of the challenges.



FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS

FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

\$125 for primary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.eov.au/csef

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2020, you do not need to complete an application form in 2021 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools in 2021 or you did not apply in 2020.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2021.

Check with the school office If you are unsure.

Bushfire At-Risk Register - Schools

School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed when a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined in their Bureau of Meteorology district. **Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire risk and is listed on the BARR.**

HIGH HIGH CODE RED

FIRE DANGER RATING

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to four days notice of a potential Code Red day closure by letter and Compass Notification. A Code Red day will be determined by the Emergency Management Commissioner no later than 1.00 pm the day before the potential closure. Once we are advised of the confirmation of the Code Red day we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.
- As a bus co-ordinating school all bus routes will be cancelled.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home or in the care of older children.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day.

As part of preparing our school for potential hazards such as fire, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan, reprioritised any maintenance works that may assist in preparing for the threat of fire and cleared our facility's grounds and gutters.

What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.
- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers. Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, by checking Compass and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.
- Most importantly at this time of year, if you're planning a holiday or short stay in the bush or in a coastal area, you should check warnings in advance of travel and remain vigilant during your stay.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

STATE SCHOOLS' RELIEF - 2022 Year 7 CSEF Uniform Package

Applications will be accepted from the beginning of Term 4, 2021.

Introduction to Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund

Through government funding the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) was established to provide payments for eligible students to attend camps, sports days and excursions. State Schools' Relief provides packages to families eligible to receive this funding.

2022 Year 7 Uniform Package for CSEF recipients

Year 7 students for 2022 that are recipients of the Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) automatically qualify for the uniform package and/or vouchers.

What's in the package?

The 2022 package contains the following items:

1 x Polo Top or Shirt

1 x Trousers / Pants or Shorts or Summer Dress

1 x Pair of Shoes (Lace Ups or T-Bars or Sneakers)

Please note:

• PE items are not included as part of this package

• Shoes must be requested in UK sizes. The SSR shoe size conversion chart is available on our website or contact Jenni in the Bright P-12 Office.

Cost to families

Where State Schools' Relief cannot supply uniform items directly, you will receive a voucher that subsidises the cost of the uniform items. The voucher can be redeemed at your child's school uniform shop, or independent uniform retailer, which will be listed on the voucher.

Families receiving vouchers *may be required to make a co-contribution payment* towards the cost of the uniform items.

The amount required to cover the gap will depend on the retail purchase price and the State Schools' Relief subsidy. The voucher provided by State Schools' Relief lists each approved item, and the maximum purchase value, that State Schools' Relief will cover. Check your school's uniform price list to work out how much extra you may need to contribute towards the uniform item. **Please note** vouchers do have an expiry date and must be redeemed before the expiry date.

How do I apply for the CSEF Uniform Package?

Applications are made through your child's school (<u>jennifer.sgambelloni@education.vic.gov.au</u>). Please refrain from contacting State Schools' Relief directly as staff are unable to accept applications from parents/families or carers. Should you have any questions, or wish to apply for assistance, please speak with the representative at your child's 2022 school.

How do I receive the uniform package?

• All items and/or vouchers provided by SSR will be delivered directly to your child's school. The school will then contact you to arrange handover of these items and/or vouchers.

• The voucher will advise whether you collect items from the school uniform shop or a retailer. If it's a retailer, please check with your school to find out the nearest store.

• If a uniform item costs more than the maximum subsidised amount, State Schools' Relief is unable to cover any further cost.

• If a uniform item costs less than the maximum subsidised amount, the difference cannot be redeemed or transferred to an alternate uniform item.
